1995-1999

Sr. Laura Reynolds of St. Vito's Church reaches out to Martha Lopez-Hanratty to start organizing the Hispanic community and help move day laborers from Halstead Ave to Columbus Park under the name Voz y Vida.

Hispanic Resource Center of Larchmont & Mamaroneck is incorporated (HRC).

2000-2004

Washingtonville Housing Alliance hosts meetings and serves as fiscal sponsor under leadership of Ellen Levy.

Harold Lasso is hired as the first Executive Director.

HRC moves to its first office space on 200 W. Boston Post Road. Case Management services and English classes begin.

Day laborer hiring site is opened at Strait Gate Church and other essential services are housed at St. Thomas Episcopal Church.

Zoe Colon, HRC's third Executive Director, is hired. HRC moves into its first prominently located office in the heart of the village.

2006-2010

Generous local donors make it possible for HRC to purchase a facility under the vision and leadership of Liz Liscio, Board Chair. HRC purchases the CAP Center, expanding its services site significantly and housing the local food pantry and Head Start and early childhood programs.

2011-2016

CRC continues to expand its footprint in the County under the insightful leadership of Jirandy Martinez, current Executive Director, who jumpstarted her career as an ESL volunteer in 2008 and Janet Rolon, Deputy Director, who started with the agency as a day laborer organizer in 2004.

/ Our Mission and Vision

Community Resource Center empowers new immigrants in Westchester County. Our 501 c (3) organization was founded in 1998 as Hispanic Resource Center of Larchmont and Mamaroneck. We work to strengthen new immigrants in our community through:

- cultural integration
- economic engagement
- professional development
- and holistic advocacy

in order to prepare new immigrant families to become self-sufficient and active members of the community.

Community Resource Center’s (CRC) vision is that through our work and effective networking, the Mamaroneck community and Westchester County will celebrate and benefit from its cultural and economic diversity.

/ Our History and Background

Over our 23 years in existence, CRC has grown from a community initiative designed to act as a clearinghouse of information and referral services, to a leading immigrant service organization that provides comprehensive direct services and programs. We provide a host of educational programs, case management and referral services and advocate for immigrants and low-income families in need. In the past year, we served nearly 4,000 adults and children in three primary areas: Case management services; Educational programs and workshops; and a Worker Center that offers job placement and career development support for men and women seeking employment.

Our holistic services and programs are specifically responsive to the needs of low-income immigrants many of whom are vulnerable due to their immigration status. From our inception as the Hispanic Resource Center, CRC has been dedicated to social justice issues and has supported the poor and marginalized members of our community through advocacy, as well as through direct programming and services.

We work closely with houses of worship, volunteers, and other social service agencies to empower the new immigrant community to create a better life for themselves and their families. While our center is based in Mamaroneck, CRC serves many individuals from surrounding communities as well. Nearly 98% of CRC clients reside in Westchester County, with the majority from Mamaroneck: 30%, New Rochelle: 16%, Port Chester: 8%, and White Plains: 11%, Mount Vernon: 4%, Harrison: 4%, others: 27% (Elmsford, Ossining, Sleepy Hollow, Peekskill). CRC’s families tend to be isolated by inadequate transportation options, lack of education in their native language, limited English language skills and underemployment. These factors make our clients much more likely to be victims of wage theft, poor housing conditions and other socioeconomic challenges.

/ Moving Forward Together

With your support CRC was able to provide much needed emergency assistance to families hard hit by COVID. With partial closings due to the pandemic, CRC addressed the surge in housing and food insecurity by providing much needed support in those areas. Funding made it possible for families to have housing and food at a time of desperate need. As a result of your support and through an emergency assistance fund, CRC was able to provide help to 300 families in Mamaroneck, Larchmont, Port Chester, New Rochelle, and White Plains. The eviction crisis has been a particularly difficult hurdle. Of the 300 families we've helped, more than half of them needed help to pay back rent or rental arrears. Some families owe 2-3 months others as many as

6 months. The high rental rates that we see in our collective communities are unaffordable to many, and put our clients in need of thousands of dollars per household. While some are starting to work slowly, their job shifts are nowhere near what they were working pre-pandemic. Fortunately, as a result of continued community discussions with local elected officials and other local organizations, we have established a community coalition that is dedicated to protecting against eviction- the Mamaroneck Coalition for Affordable Housing. The last thing we want is families to end up displaced, homeless, or leaving our community.

/ Challenges Ahead





In 2019, our operating budget was \$884,519.73. In just one year, we managed to raise an additional \$207,493.27 from well-respected institutions and through our long-standing individual supporters.
